



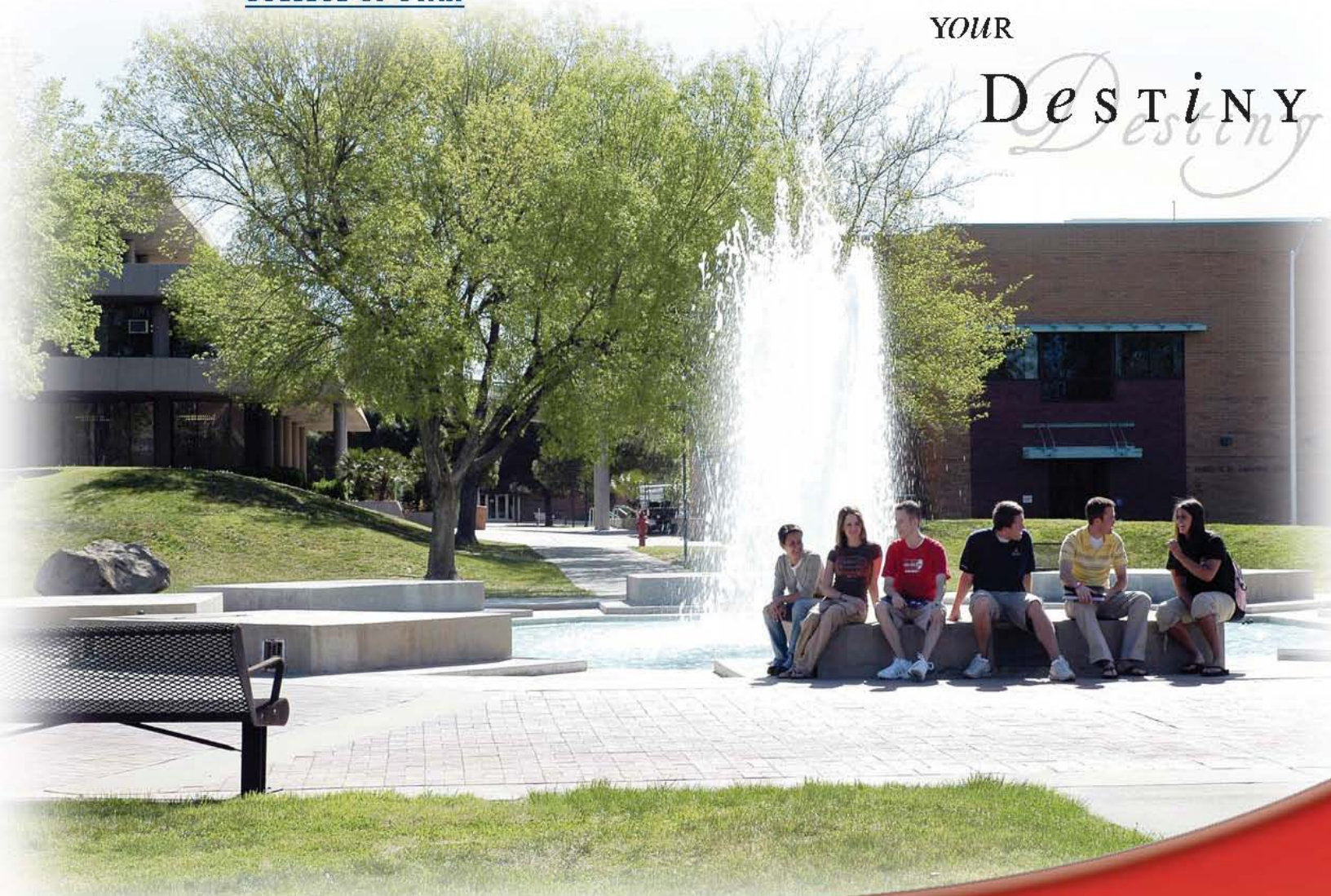

Program Advisors help students to understand the class work required for the major and to build a graduation plan.

Keep in mind that

YOU ARE RESPONSIBLE FOR YOUR OFFICIAL COLLEGE RECORDS

Check them often, especially your class schedule. For example, you are responsible for making sure you are officially dropped by the registrar from a class you decide not to attend.

Be self-motivated. Decide what classes you want to take. Search out study groups. Pay attention in class. Know what you need to do to graduate. Don't just take your friend's word; talk to a college official to make sure.

YOU ARE RESPONSIBLE FOR YOUR OWN LEARNING

YOU ARE RESPONSIBLE FOR YOUR STUDY HABITS

Find the techniques that work best for you; find a place free of distractions to study, and take your studies seriously.

Track your grades! Know what grade you are getting and what you need to do to maintain, improve, or correct your grade. Your grades will be with you forever; there's no erasing a poor grade!

YOU ARE RESPONSIBLE FOR YOUR GRADES

YOU ARE RESPONSIBLE FOR KNOWING THE DEADLINES

For example, be aware of add or drop dates, the last day to get a refund, and the graduation audit deadline.

Take it upon yourself to check in with your advisor to make sure you are in the right classes each semester. Know your degree requirements and your degree year. Once you decide on a program, be declared in that program.

YOU ARE RESPONSIBLE FOR YOUR DEGREE

YOU ARE RESPONSIBLE FOR YOUR FINANCES

Know your options for financial aid. Use your money wisely so as to stay out of debt as much as possible.

Don't overload yourself and don't procrastinate. Expect to study at least two hours out of class for every hour spent in class. Make college a high priority.

YOU ARE RESPONSIBLE FOR YOUR TIME

YOU ARE RESPONSIBLE FOR YOUR OWN CONDUCT

Be respectful of the other students, your instructors, and the staff. Don't push boundaries or break rules; for example, don't plagiarize or cheat. If you are arrested, not only do you run the risk of getting kicked out of school, you'll have a criminal record that will follow you around the rest of your life.

Getting Started at DSC

Admissions (435-652-7702)

- Submit an admissions application to the Admissions Office.
- Have official high school and college/university transcripts sent to the Admissions Office.
- Send ACT or SAT scores or take the College Placement Test (CPT) at the Testing Center.
- Pay the non-refundable admission fee to the Cashier.

Financial Aid (435-652-7505)

If you need financial aid, complete a Free Application for Financial Assistance (FAFSA) and contact the Financial Aid Office for priority application dates. Apply early!

- Contact the Financial Aid Office and complete a DSC Verification Form.
- Academic scholarships are awarded automatically to qualified students upon completion and submission of admissions application.

Registration (Signing up for classes) (435-652-7701)

Attend an Orientation and Registration session (all new freshman are required to attend).

- Obtain a current college catalog and a class schedule from the bookstore or go to www.dixie.edu to view them online.
- Determine placement scores for English, Math and Reading from ACT, SAT, Compass or CPT scores.
- Consider the associate degree requirements in the catalog or class schedule.

Payment of Tuition and fees (652-7605)

- Pay your tuition and fees at the cashiers' office in person, by phone, mail, or on-line.

Housing and Campus Meals (tel:435-652-7570)

Contact the housing office for information about on and off-campus housing. Information is also available in the class schedule.

- Arrange housing early and pay the housing deposit.
- Purchase campus meal tickets, which are required for on-campus housing students. Off-campus students may also obtain meal tickets.

Registration Tips

General guidelines for registering:

1. Make sure you are fully admitted. (This means you either received a letter saying that you are admitted or you have confirmed admittance with the registration office. To be fully admitted you must have submitted a completed application, a \$35 admissions fee, high school transcripts, and ACT, SAT or CPT scores (which are often posted on high school transcripts). You can test at Dixie. If you have taken classes at another college or university, we will also need those official transcripts.)
2. Register early! The later your register, the harder it becomes to make your ideal schedule.
3. To prepare yourself to register for classes you should have a course schedule and a catalog. These can be found on-line or at the college bookstore (435-652-7644).

Choosing courses

1. At Dixie we require placement scores for English, reading, and mathematics. Your placement score is determined by your test scores. See the placement score page to determine which English, reading, and math classes you should take.
2. If you qualify for English 1010, Freshman English, we recommend this course your first semester.
3. General Education (GE) Courses: Students must first choose which degree they will earn and take the appropriate GE courses. If a full-time student plans to graduate with an associate's degree in two years, s/he must take 3 or 4 GE classes per semester. If a developmental English placement course is required, a student should not take History, Literature, Humanities, or Social Science courses his/her first semester. If a developmental reading course is required, Science classes should also be delayed until that class is completed.
4. Courses may be dropped in the first three weeks of the semester with a full refund. It is not advised to start classes late. It is very difficult to add classes after the first three days of a semester and requires faculty permission.
5. Majors: Freshmen students are typically uncertain about a major. If a student has not made a choice of a major, s/he should do some exploring of classes the first two semesters to try to clarify a major.
6. Take a fun class. Between 12 and 20 credits the cost for tuition and fees are the same, so if a student has time, we recommend taking a class for fun, relaxation, or personal enrichment. If a student does not want a grade in a class, s/he can audit the course.
7. Students should attend classes on the first day of each semester. If a student misses a first class, the faculty may choose to administratively drop the student from that class. If it is not possible to attend the first class, a student should contact the professor.

If the 1001 course for your major will not work with your schedule, pick an ASC 1001 course instead.

What is an elective class, anyway?

Any class that is 1000-level (college-level) or higher and is an accredited college class will count as an elective. These can be extra general education classes (for example, if you take two Fine Arts GE classes, one will go toward your elective credits) or pre-requisite classes (such as Education 1010 for the Education program), or personal interest classes (like tennis). Elective credits allow you to explore the different majors and take classes just for fun. Elective courses can count toward more than one degree—for example, if you are a music major, your music lessons will count toward your music degree and toward your associate degree elective credits. If a class can be repeated for credit, this will be stated in the college catalog entry.

Example 1: If you take tennis 1 twice, only one of those times will count as an elective toward graduation because this class can not be repeated for credit.

Example 2: If you take symphonic band each semester, it will count toward graduation each time because this course can be repeated for credit.

Example 3: If you take English 0470 because you're good at English and think it will be an easy way for you to fill some extra credits for your scholarship, know that though this class will count for financial aid, it will not count as an elective toward graduation because it is not a 1000-level course.

- Communication Design (VT 1300)
- Intro to Internet Development (VT 1400)

If none of these classes sound appealing, spend some time browsing through our class listings to see if anything catches your eye.

Adding, Auditing, and Dropping Classes

To add a class:

Students may add classes online up to the third day of the semester, if the class is not full. If the class is full, the student will need to obtain the instructor's signature in order to add the class. After the third day of the semester, and through the fourth week of the semester, students may add classes if an add card is signed by the instructor, though to add a class after the first week of school is not usually to the student's advantage.

To audit a class:

An audited class is a class that a student has paid for and is able to attend, but is also a class for which the student will not be awarded credits or a grade. You may audit individual classes up to the 8th week of the semester by filling out an audit card at the registration office. Students often audit classes they are taking only for fun (such as Yoga or Tennis), classes that are proving particularly difficult and that a student knows he or she will probably have to retake anyway (not usually Yoga or Tennis), or classes that a student is taking for personal enrichment (such as Quickbooks). **Audited classes do not count toward graduation.**

To drop a class:

Students may drop individual classes online up until the semester begins. **DO NOT ATTEMPT TO DROP ALL CLASSES AT ONCE!** This is known as "purging classes" and your account will automatically be frozen if you attempt it. A grade will not appear on your transcript if you drop a class within the first three weeks. After that, a "W" will appear on your transcript for classes dropped. Classes can be dropped through the eighth week of the semester, but refunds will not be available after approximately the third week of the semester. **Be sure to check with registration to make sure that your classes were actually dropped.**

To drop all classes/withdraw from school:

You may apply for a complete withdrawal at the Registrar's office up to the 12th week of the semester. However, no refund will be given after the third week of the semester. Complete withdrawals must be done through the registrar's office. **Do not attempt to drop all your classes online!** If you try to do so yourself, your account will freeze, a purge classes hold will be placed on your account, and those classes will NOT be dropped.

Dmail

Do not ignore your dmail account! It is the college's email account, and it is through this account that people at the college will contact you. Even if you specify another email account as your preferred account, the college may still use your dmail account to send you information. Not only will your teachers contact you through dmail, but so will the admissions office, financial aid, and the business office. It is important to log-in to your dmail frequently, or you might miss assignments, school notifications, your graduation status, or even your scholarship award—to name a few.

Your dmail account is actually a google account, so not only will it function like a gmail account, but it will not be terminated when you leave DSC. This is a wonderful advantage to students and faculty alike, because not only can we keep in touch with you here and now, but you'll still have the email address years down the road.

You can access and activate your dmail account through the college's website, www.dixie.edu; through your own email account, to which a dmail activation link should have been sent; or at the Smith Computer Center help desk, phone: (435) 652-7960.

Blackboard Vista

Blackboard Vista is an online system for students and instructors to share information, assignments, and other materials that relate to your classes and college education. Many instructors at Dixie use Blackboard exclusively as a means of distance learning, and it is through Blackboard that you will do LIB 1010, CIS 1200, and other online courses. Your co-op classes will also be on Blackboard. Other professors may store only a few items on your Blackboard page—like the class syllabus, assignments, notes, videos, documents, or web links. Your classmates will also be on Blackboard, so you can get in touch with them during the semester through Blackboard. You can also check your grades and assignments due on Blackboard, as well as check on the assignments you've previously turned in. In other words, Blackboard will be a major tool in helping you earn your degree here at Dixie.

Be aware that your login to Blackboard will be different from your student account and your email account. Your username will be some combination of your name and a number. Your password will initially be your birthday in 6-digit format (mmddyy). You can log into Blackboard through the Dixie website; or at the Smith Computer Center help desk, phone: (435) 652-7960; or by emailing itc@dixie.edu.

What classes count toward graduation?

Any class that is 1000-level or above will count as a college level class and will count toward graduation. The vast majority of classes offered at Dixie State College are college level. Classes that are not college level are known as developmental classes. These are classes such as Math 0990, English 0470, and English 0990. Developmental classes will not count toward graduation. In addition, classes taken more than once for credit might only count for graduation once. For example, if you take Personal Finance 1750 twice because you love the subject, be aware that only one of those two classes will count toward graduation. Also, classes taken at the DXATC or other applied technology colleges or certificate colleges generally do not count toward college credit. So, classes taken at a cosmetology school will probably not count toward your associate degree here at Dixie.

Why can't I log into Student Services?

The most common reasons why students cannot login include:

- You are not fully admitted yet
- You are admitted but aren't entering the correct login & PIN number (call 652-7701)
- You have entered the incorrect PIN number more than three times and are now locked out
- Your web browser's security is set up to not accept cookies

You can use your banner student number or your social security number (without slashes or dashes) for your user ID. Initially, your PIN is your six digit birth date.

Is my admissions application complete?

You can find out by contacting the admissions office at 435-652-7701

Why can't I register for this one class?

The primary reasons why a student cannot register for their class(es) include:

- The course prerequisites have not been met (minimum test scores, need prior coursework, instructor permission needed, etc). If you have taken the prerequisite course, then your transfer work may not yet be posted on the system. Contact the advisement office (435-652-7690) to verify this or to contact transcript evaluation.
- You have not met the course corequisites (i.e. must also register for LIB 1010 to register for ENGL 1010).
- You have a registration hold (have not attended orientation, owe money, etc.)

What is my DixieOne Card? Can I throw it away?

Do not throw away your DixieOne Card! It is your student ID, a debit card, and your college card all rolled into one. For example, when financial aid sends you reimbursements or scholarship money, it will go to your DixieOne card. Keep your card in a safe place, and check the balance often. If you lose your card, see the cashiers to obtain a new one. There is a \$20 replacement fee.

How do I apply for a scholarship?

When you apply for admission, you are automatically considered for an academic scholarship based on your high school GPA and ACT (or other) test scores. The difficulty of your course work is also taken into consideration. To apply for talent scholarships go to the Financial Aid Website: <http://new.dixie.edu/financial/index.php>.

Where can I get housing?

Can I get a work study position?

- College work study funds are part of a student's financial aid package and cannot be awarded unless you have submitted a FAFSA and have documented need. You can complete the FAFSA on line at www.fafsa.ed.gov.
- Work study funds are awarded on a first-come, first-served basis.
- Because of limited funds, you should apply for financial aid early if you wish to participate in the work study program.
- A work study award generally allows you to work 15-20 hours a week. The starting salary is \$7.25 per hour .
- Work study occurs during the Fall and Spring Semesters only; there are no positions available during Summer.

The Federal Work Study Program is authorized and funded by the Federal Government. The UCOPE Work Study Program is authorized and funded by the Utah State Legislature. Only the Office of Financial Assistance may award work study funds. Eligible students will receive their work study award as part of their "total" financial aid award.

If work study isn't part of your financial aid award and you are interested in working on campus, please contact the work study coordinator, Roberta Cole at (435) 652-7584 or rcole@dixie.edu. If you did not receive a work study offer, and you qualify, we will consider you for any positions still available after the third week of August.

The Appeals Process

Academic appeals:

If you need to appeal college requirements that relate to your academic progress (for example, you need to withdraw from a class after the drop deadline due to extraneous circumstances), you may fill out an Academic Appeals form. These can be found at the admissions/registration office. Return the form to the registration office or to the advisor you are working with.

financial aid appeal:

If you have lost your eligibility for Financial Aid, you may make an appeal to the Financial Aid Appeals Committee. Financial Aid appeals forms may be found and filled out at the Financial Aid office.

Scholastic Standards

Dixie State College is an open-access institution; therefore, *all* students with the potential to succeed are welcome. However, each student must assume the responsibility to progress academically and technically while at Dixie.

LOW ACADEMIC STATUS results when a student's GPA falls below a 2.0. Transfer credits carry the same academic weight as do credits earned at Dixie.

If your GPA is below a 2.0, you will be placed on Academic Warning, Academic Probation, or Academic Suspension. Therefore, it is imperative you keep or return your grade at/to a 2.0 or higher. A student cannot graduate with a GPA lower than a 2.0, and students with less than a 2.0 may have holds placed on their accounts. Please contact the advisement office at 652-7690 if your GPA falls below a 2.0.

Categories of Low Academic Status

- **WARNING:** the semester after a student's GPA falls below a 2.0, the student will be placed on warning.
- **CONDITIONAL ENROLLMENT (PROBATION):** If a student is on warning and fails to raise his/her GPA above a 2.0, s/he will be placed on conditional enrollment. Students on conditional enrollment are required to meet regularly with their advisor and may only register with an advisor.
- **SUSPENSION:** If a student does not earn a 2.0 the semester or semesters following conditional enrollment (this depends on the details of your contract with your advisor), the student will be suspended from school for at least one semester (Fall or Spring) and will have to petition the school for readmission.

Answer Sheet

1. True Tuition is due the first day of classes.
2. True Students are held liable for their tuition and fees account until it is paid in full. Students are responsible for paying their portion of tuition and fees by the date due and monitoring their account to ensure that their financial aid has dispersed. Financial Aid is delayed when students do not complete all the steps in the process. One step that is often overlooked is the thank you letter that needs to be written to the donor if that is required.
3. True The \$50 late payment fee is nonrefundable and will not be waived.
4. True If a student changes his/her schedule by adding classes, he/she may have additional charges due. Students should check their account balance each time a change is made to his/her schedule to determine the new balance due.
5. False Tuition and fees are refundable at 100% for the first 21 calendar days of classes. After that, students will be responsible for the full amount due, including a late fee.
6. True The Monthly Payment Plan is a program intended to help students who are not able to pay their account in full by the tuition and fee deadline. Instead of one large payment, tuition and fees are broken down into equal monthly payments. Enrollment in a plan is available at the time of registration prior to the beginning of each semester.
7. True For fiscal year 2007-08 it cost approximately \$156 million to operate the school. Tuition and fees only provided \$53 million (33%). To find out more about this, please reference a "Fast Facts" brochure.

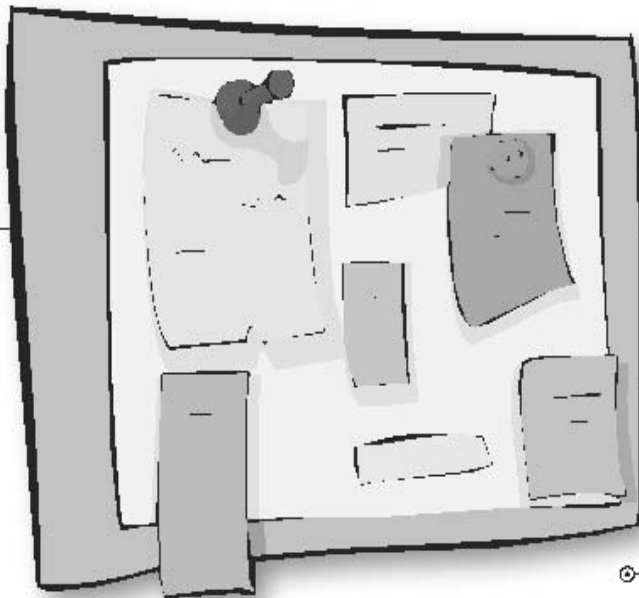

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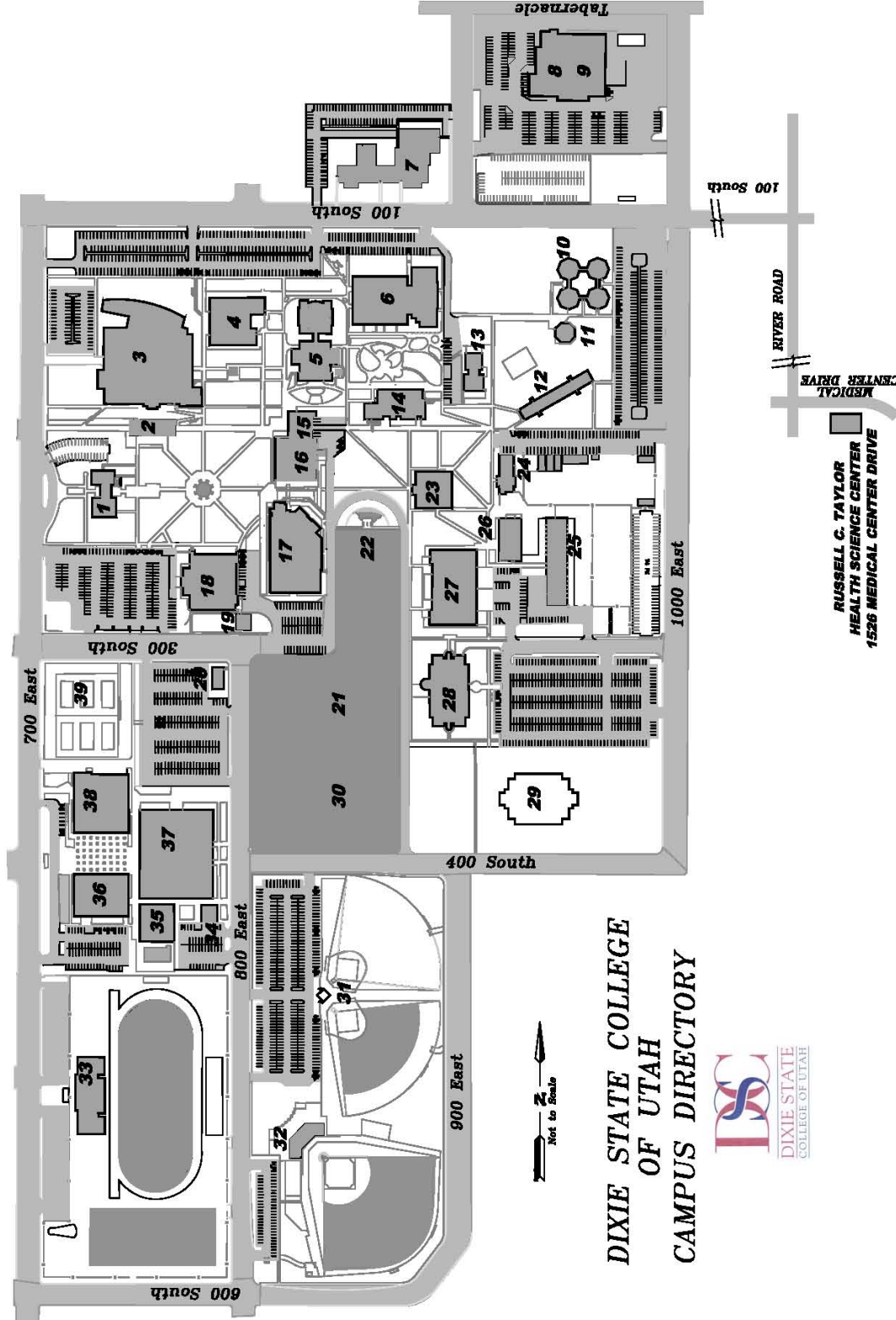
